Mayor Smith called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and acknowledged that the meeting is being held on the traditional, ancestral and unceded territories of the Stó:lō people, particularly the Chawathil, Union Bar and Yale First Nations.

(b) Communities in Bloom

Representatives from Communities in Bloom were in attendance to present to Council regarding their 2024 highlights, the Communities in Bloom judging, and their 2025 plans. In their presentation, the following items were discussed:

- Hope Communities in Bloom achieved a 5-bloom rating in 2024
- 2024 Highlights
 - Held litter pickups in the downtown core, Old Hope Princeton Way, and Flood Hope Road
 - Planted, weeded, and cut back vegetation on 6th Avenue and the base of Mount Hope
 - Planted daffodils at the base of the new signage at exit 170 and filled the downtown planters

- Coordinated recycling efforts at the Earth Day event and encouraged participation in Trash to Treasure
- Maintained the District's chainsaw carvings
- Checked holiday lights and placed locally harvested grains in downtown planters
- Encouraged support in District initiatives including the FireSmart and Downtown Improvement meetings
- Gathered information and pictures for the Communities in Bloom Judge's Profile Book
- Cleaned up around the Recreation Centre
- Future Plans
 - Revitalize the junction area at the base of Mount Hope through the purchase of shrubs or other materials
 - Chainsaw Carving Event on August 14-17, 2025

Teresa Williams, Co-Chair of Hope Communities in Bloom, presented Council with a certificate recognizing their support for the organization and noting that together they make Hope a wonderful place to live, work, and play. The Mayor thanked Kevin Dicken, Director of Operations, and Sarah Brown, AdvantageHOPE Operations Manager and Curator, for their efforts in completing the District signage project which was a highlight of the judge's tour.

(c) Diversity Disconnect Research Project

Representatives from Free Rein Associates were in attendance to present to Council regarding the Diversity Disconnect Research Project. In their presentation, the following items were discussed:

- Estimated Outreach
 - 5 communities
 - Princeton
 - Merritt
 - Ashcroft
 - Agassiz
 - Hope
 - 75 service providers
 - 100 employers
 - 450 individuals
- Research Methods
 - Focus groups
 - One-on-one interviews
 - Online and written surveys
- Perceptions of Diversity
 - 82% of employers agreed or strongly agreed that they adequately reflected diversity within their business
 - 49% of job seekers and 63% of employees agreed or strongly agreed
 - There is a disconnect between employers believing they are doing a good job, while employees and job seekers do not agree

- Success at Work
 - 74% of employees agreed or strongly agreed that their employer can support their success
 - 88% of employers agreed that they can support that success
 - None of the employers felt negatively about this question
- Level of Support
 - 40% of employers felt that they struggled to balance equity, diversity, and inclusion of underrepresented groups
 - 68% of employees agree or strongly agree that employers fully support the employment of individuals with specific needs
 - Job seekers were neutral in their perception of support in this area
- Employment Task Alignment and Disconnects
 - Job seekers and employees both ranked orientation on-the-job training as something that is easy
 - Both groups ranked finding opportunities in their top three most difficult
 - Employees and employers both ranked getting or offering advancement opportunities in their top three most difficult
 - Employers ranked providing a welcoming environment in their easiest tasks, while job seekers are ranking it in their top three most difficult
 - Job seekers put career direction in their top three easiest, while employees ranked it in their top three most difficult
- Essential Skills
 - Communication is important for both finding and maintaining employment
 - Writing, digital, and creativity & innovation are ranked in the bottom three of both groups
- Success Factors
 - The top 20 success factors were pulled from interview results and ranked by number of appearances
 - Transportation was the only factor that was not mentioned by employers, while it was mentioned by almost every service provider and individual
- Connecting the Data
 - Limited awareness from employers regarding the scope and complexity of employment challenges
 - Lack of awareness and isolation issues in terms of people with access needs in communities
 - Some communities were more willing to share, while other were hesitant
 - Service providers in Princeton are very connected and share information
- Recommendations
 - Get Real
 - Foster a shared understanding through a holistic, systems-based exploration of stakeholder experiences
 - Make It Personal
 - Reflect deeply to examine your role in the disconnects between

stakeholder groups, identifying a manageable and meaningful shift

- Stay Diligent
 - Continuously monitor and evaluate your efforts, inviting feedback and adapting/customizing your approach
- Work Together
 - Look around your community for opportunities to collaborate on solutions, identify and develop partnerships, and coordinate efforts
- Get Loud
 - Share stories of success, challenges, and frustrations to amplify your message and the voice of those underrepresented

Council inquired as to whether any of the data collected from the five individual communities differs greatly from the combined summary in the presentation. The delegation advised that the data does differ between communities, with Princeton having the most equal spread among respondents, Ashcroft lacking in respondents, and Merritt have only one respondent per group despite having the largest population. They added that Merritt has the largest number of service providers, but they do not communicate with each other, leading to issues for individuals locating services. The delegation noted that they would forward links to the report and an upcoming podcast series to Council and Staff.

5. STAFF REPORTS

(a) Report dated November 28, 2024 from the Chief Administrative Officer Re: Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest – Squeah Forest Road Access

Council inquired as to what options are available to rectify the access issue. The CAO advised that the two available options are having the Province resolve the access issue, or a substitute tenure being provided. He noted that with the historical lack of Provincial action it may be too difficult to provide a solution to the access issue, and that an alternate tenure is the preferred option. Council inquired as to whether the other partners have already agreed to the letter outlined in the report. The CAO advised that Chawathil First Nation and the Fraser Valley Regional District are in the process of bringing forward this item for approval.

Mayor Smith Reported:

- He received a thank you letter from the band “A Flock of Seagulls” who stopped in Hope to see the Rambo Carving. He noted that they stayed overnight in Hope before continuing their tour across Canada.
- He attended the Economic Trust of the Southern Interior Board meeting where he represented the District and Fraser Valley Regional District Areas A & B during discussions regarding project funding.

- He attended the Dent Construction 50th Anniversary celebration, noting that a total of 172 people were in attendance and that there is an insert in the Hope Standard on the history of the company.
- He met with representatives from the University of the Fraser Valley and noted that the university location in Hope will have new leadership and new plans will be announced in the New Year.
- He acknowledged the passing of Dick Gardner, noting his outstanding volunteerism, leadership in the community, time the Hope Fire Department, the demolition derby, and the Lions Club.
- He attended the Stuff the Cruiser event at Kal Tire along with Councillor Skoglund, noting that he enjoyed breakfast and great conversation with those who came out to support the initiative.
- He noted that the Hope Library event was a success, and included green screen photo opportunities, letters to Santa, hot chocolate and candy canes, and play time. He added that many new people signed up to join the library.
- On behalf of Mayor, Council, and Staff, he wished everyone a happy and safe holiday.

Councillor Skoglund Reported:

- She attended the Hope Community Choir Christmas Concert on December 1st at the Grace Baptist Church, noting that it was standing room only and over \$1,700 in donations were raised to support a bursary for Hope Secondary School students.
- She attended the Stuff the Cruiser event at Kal Tire on December 7th, noting that three cruisers were filled with food, and \$5,774 was raised. She added that Kal Tire will be matching \$5,000 in cash donations, bringing the total raised to \$10,774.

Councillor Medlock Reported:

- He attended Dick Gardner's memorial service, noting that many great stories were told, and added that he did a lot for this community.
- He noted that Brian McKinney reached out regarding the District's Hope Museum Golden Moments reserve fund, currently reserved for reprinting of that book, and the possibility of using it to reprint the Forging a New Hope book. The CAO advised that if Council wishes, this reserve fund could be re-allocated by passing a resolution. The Mayor advised that the District has been unable to contact the rightsholder of the Golden Moments book which has prevented reprinting.

Mayor Smith called the Public Hearing to order at 6:30 p.m.

The purpose of the Public Hearing is to hear input on amendments to the ***District of Hope Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1378, 2016*** and ***District of Hope Zoning Bylaw No. 1324, 2012***.

- **District of Hope Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 1591, 2024:**

To redesignate the land use designation in the Official Community Plan for the property at 61934 Estell Road from Highway Commercial to Light/Service Industry.

- **District of Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 1592, 2024:**

To rezone the property at 61934 Estell Road from Rural (RU-1) to Light/Service Industrial (I-2).

The Director of Corporate Services read the Chairperson Statement and confirmed that no submissions were received.

The Mayor called for any questions or comments from the public or members of Council.

Council requested confirmation that notices were distributed to all properties within the notification area. The Director of Community Development advised that despite the Canada Post strike, notices were hand delivered to all properties within the notification area. He added that all property owners were also notified with the exception of one who lives outside of the District and could not be reached.

Josh Hall, owner of the subject property, advised that he is in attendance to answer any questions.

The Director of Corporate Services called twice for any questions or comments from the public or members of Council; hearing none, it was noted that no further submissions, either verbal or written, regarding the proposed bylaws can be made to Council. The Public Hearing was declared closed at 6:36 p.m.

PURPOSE:

To provide an update to Council on the scope and timeline for the Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaw update project.

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT council receive for information the staff report outlining the project scope and work plan for the District of Hope Official Community Plan and Zoning Bylaw update project.

BACKGROUND:

The last Official Community Plan (OCP) for District of Hope was completed in 2016. The overarching goals of the plan have served the community well and have provided a solid framework for growth. While many of the goals remain relevant, there have been substantial changes to provincial legislation, market conditions, and emerging issues that require the plan to be updated.

A driving factor for the update is the provincial requirement to plan for and to pre-designate/ pre-zone lands to meet the anticipated 20-year housing demand within the community. This demand is summarized in the *2024 Interim Housing Needs Report*, completed by staff last year. The province requires that updates to our regulatory documents (OCP and Zoning Bylaw) must be completed by December 31, 2025.

A one-year window is an ambitious timeline for an OCP update. To ensure we meet our goals and legislated timelines, staff have contracted with Stantec Consulting Ltd to help complete the work.

ANALYSIS:

The current OCP has received general support as development proposals have tested policy over time. The update provides an opportunity for Hope to review its goals and to consider how we wish to grow over the next 20 years.

OCP Scope

Local Government Act s.473 requires the following to be included in an OCP:

- the approximate location, amount, type and density of residential development required to meet anticipated housing needs over a period of at least 20 years
- the approximate location, amount and type of present and proposed commercial, industrial, institutional, agricultural, recreational and public utility land uses
- the approximate location and area of sand and gravel deposits that are suitable for future sand and gravel extraction
- restrictions on the use of land that is subject to hazardous conditions or that is environmentally sensitive to development
- the approximate location and phasing of any major road, sewer and water systems
- the approximate location and type of present and proposed public facilities, including schools, parks and waste treatment and disposal sites
- targets for the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions

In addition to the required content, the following areas require attention during the OCP update:

- Inclusion of content reflecting Indigenous interests in their traditional territory
- Identification of residential growth areas and potential new forms of housing
- Consideration of the industrial land base
- Integration of the Hope Downtown Action Plan
- Integration of Master Plans for servicing and transportation
- Consideration of electric vehicle charging stations
- Consideration of short-term rentals policies
- Review and update to form and character design guidelines
- Inclusion of updated flood and geohazard information

Staff anticipate changes to land use designations will focus primarily on lands for residential development and potentially on lands for industrial uses.

Zoning Bylaw Scope

Updates to the Zoning Bylaw are required to address the anticipated housing demand. The full scope of work will be determined after we analyze the existing development

potential under our current regulations and identify any shortfalls. Staff anticipate the creation of a higher density zone for apartments / condos or mixed use residential and commercial buildings within the downtown and a review of downtown parking requirements may be warranted.

Staff and Stantec will work together to follow the general workplan below. Detailed deliverables are available for each stage.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with information on the grant applications for the \$57,000 available as the remaining funds disbursed to the District from the Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest (CLCCF) in 2023.

From time-to-time, when the CLCCF disburses funds to its partners (Yale First Nation, Fraser Valley Regional District, and Hope), the District policy is to offer these funds as granting opportunities to various groups and/or individuals. This opportunity is kept most flexible (by design), and the criteria are published as part of the Policy (attached).

The most recent application deadline was November 18, 2024, and the opportunity was advertised in the Hope Standard, the District Webpage, and the various social media platforms the District of Hope utilizes. In total nine applications were received on time.

RESOLUTION:

Staff seek Council direction on how to proceed with distribution of the grant funding.

ANALYSIS:

Grants are considered based on the following criteria:

1. Programs/Activities/Events of the Agency must:

- (a) strengthen and enhance the wellbeing of our community;
- (b) promote volunteerism; and
- (c) be a District of Hope and area registered non-profit society, community group, or individual.

2. Programs/Activities/Events of applicants must not:

- (a) cover remuneration of any type whatsoever;
- (b) cover capital improvements to private, rented or leased premises;

- (c) subsidize private enterprise; and/or

The grant requests are detailed below, by the type of organization that is requesting the grant, the intended use of the grant funds and the resulting purpose of the grant. Any other considerations regarding applicability are detailed within the analysis.

1) Mount Hope Senior Citizens Housing Society

Non-profit – To update the fire system, which includes but is not limited to, adding more sensors and checking and flushing all sprinkler lines.

2) Hope Community Services

Non-profit – To provide support for the Holly Days Campaign which provides hampers of food and gifts to members of the community who are in need. The purpose of the funds is to ensure that the Food Resource Centers shelves are stocked into 2025.

3) Canyon Golden Age Society

Non-profit – to improve the lighting in the hall and upgrade the failing fluorescent fixtures to LED fixtures.

4) Fraser Valley Mountain Bikers Association Society

Non-profit – to do a post winter clean up the rails in The Core as well as First Blood on Hope Mountain. One area of consideration is that the request does have a component that is paying labour costs of \$4,500 which is outside of the grant parameters which is outlined in point 2(a) above.

5) Hope Community Garden

Non-profit – purchase 14 grow box kits to replace the rotting lower beds and existing raised beds. The purpose is to provide teaching, learning and food security for members of the community.

6) EmpowerED Support Services Society

Non-profit – a combination of honorarium, supplies, and printing materials, which will be used to demonstrate container gardening to help community members create their own container garden.

7) Hope Mountain Centre for Outdoor Learning

Non-profit – to develop a new brochure focussed on black bear conservation through prevention and intervention.

8) Hope District Arts Council

Non-profit – to create and install a story board near the Art Machine garden. The goal is to provide education and inspiration to the community and visitors to the community.

9) District of Hope Ratepayers Association

Non-profit – upgrade of video equipment. The purpose is to allow the association to continue to provide residents with information at Council meetings, who are unable to attend the meetings.

Further considerations

If all the above is approved, the District would still have \$5,160 funds that are unallocated from the 2023 CLCCF distribution the District received. The recommendation for the unused balance is to allocate these for the 2026 budget.

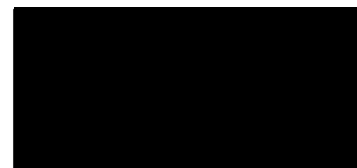

We typically rely on private and corporate donations and fund-raising activities to support Holly Days. Last year, we served 193 hampers (58 families and 135 singles/couples) at a cost of nearly \$19,000. So far this year, we have 56 families and 83 singles/couples with 22 families on the waitlist.

We are hopeful that donations and fundraising activities will again be sufficient to cover the costs of this year's Holly Days Campaign. However, in the months following (January, February, March), donations are significantly down while demand typically increases. January – March 12024, the Food Resource Center had a combined deficit of around \$12,000. We are asking for funding to help mitigate the deficits that typically follow the Holly Days Campaign and help ensure that Food Resource Center shelves remain stocked throughout January, February and March.

Please explain how you will measure and evaluate the impact of this project on the community? How will you determine if it was successful?

We will use the same metrics as in prior years – community members served. It is always our goal to have nobody left on the waitlist and in need of Christmas food and comforts. Regarding this funding request specifically, reduced deficits in Q1 2025 or even further, would be viewed as a success from our standpoint.

1. What are your organization's goals and objectives related to this application?

The goals are to maintain previously built trails on Hope Mountain and in The Core, finishing touches on previously built trails on Hope Mountain, post winter clean up on trails in The Core and on Hope Mountain as well as to host a grand opening celebration of the new "Signature Trail" on Hope Mountain which has been formally named First Blood.

2. How do the services of your agency overlap a similar agency, and what efforts have been taken to eliminate the duplication if any?

There are currently no other agencies in Hope actively building mountain bike trails. While our primary focus is on mountain biking, the trails we construct are also enjoyed by a variety of users, including hikers, dog walkers, and trail runners.

The Hope Mountain Centre is another organization involved in trail development in Hope. However, their trails are not suitable for mountain biking, and any cycling-friendly trails they maintain would not be considered dedicated mountain bike trails.

Additionally, we have built a hiking trail branching off of First Blood, providing the first public access to the base of Four Mile Falls. As the Hope Mountain Centre is not currently involved in the construction of this trail network, no specific efforts were taken to eliminate potential duplication of work.

3. How is the function of your organization mainly for the benefit of the citizens of the District of Hope?

The new "Signature Trail" on Hope Mountain that is to be named First Blood was built with the intended purpose of providing residents of Hope their first sanctioned intermediate to advanced mountain bike trail. First Blood was built with the intention of providing the mountain bike community in Hope what they asked for, which was a full length trail that will help support tourism and a younger demographic. Furthermore, the hiking trail to Four Mile Falls will provide residents, and tourists alike, the first trail access to the base of these falls; given its easy access this trail will provide great opportunities for a short hike or dog walk after work and on weekend. While we have been involved with the construction of mountain bike trails in The Core these trails are entry level, short trails more intended for quick laps when time is short and to introduce new riders to the sport.

4. In the past year, how many persons has your organization served?

While our organization has around 1000 members our trail networks across the Fraser Valley are enjoyed by thousands and thousands of mountain bikers, hikers, trail runners and dog walkers on an annual basis. We also serve the community through training and community trail building days and the trails we build, maintain and manage are used for various trail running and mountain bike races with part of the proceeds of these events often being donated to local charities. Within Hope we held a trail building workshop to members of the local BC Wild Fire crews and members of the

community in the spring of 2023. In the spring of 2021 we also spent a day training the members of the Haig Fire Base on trail building and trail building specific wood working skills and in the fall of 2021 we held a community trail building workshop at Mountainview Brewing and followed that up with a trail building day at The Core in the afternoon.

5. How long has your organization been in existence in Hope:

FVMBA has been in existence for 21 years but FVMBA was first approached by a group of Hope residents in 2019 when they asked us to assist them in advocating for a legal and sustainable mountain bike trail network; we have been advocating and working towards mountain bike trail networks in Hope ever since.

6. Has your organization ever received Grant-in-Aid funding from the District of Hope?

Yes, we applied for and received funding in 2019. The purpose of these funds were to “ground truth” the area around Hope to find the most suitable location for a large mountain bike trail network that would meet the needs of locals and draw tourists to the area. The end result of this was the chosen location on Hope Mountain where we have now almost completed the “Signature Trail” called First Blood. We have also completed a hiking trail on Hope Mountain providing viewing access to Four Mile Falls as well as feeder trails with plans for more trails in the future as funding and demand permits. Volunteers have also completed another trail on Hope Mountain, named Columbia, with future plans to link this up with First Blood and these initial plans were a result of the 2019 funding. We also received funding in 2022 and those funds were used to help build the beginner trails at “The Core.”

Yes, we are a non-profit society but do have a paid Executive Manager and Trail Crew.

Prior to the completion of the trails named First Blood and Columbia on Hope Mountain the area surrounding Hope did not have any legally sanctioned mountain bike trails that could serve as a draw for tourism; some of the funds applied for will assist in the marketing of these new trails in order to draw greater tourism in the future via a grand opening celebration and hiring of a professional photographer.
2. January 8, 2025 - Hope Museum Artifacts for Deaccession

When an object is accessioned into the Hope Museum's collection, it becomes part of the material culture of British Columbia as well as the legal property of the District of Hope. Collection priorities change over time, and with the Hope Museum's changing circumstances there is an opportunity to reassess the museum collection to be sure that Hope's history is truly highlighted. The priority is to keep as much as possible within the museum system, so objects in this list that are in good condition are recommended to be offered to other museums in BC through the mailing list of the BC Museums Association and reassessed if they are not accepted by any other museum. Objects that are in too poor of a condition to be accepted by other museums (or if they pose a danger to humans in some way that cannot be mitigated) are recommended for disposal. In the case of any objects that were never accessioned into the collection and no donation paperwork is associated, as these objects are not legally owned by the District of Hope, we cannot offer them to other museums so I recommend disposal as abandoned property.

**DISTRICT OF HOPE
BYLAW NO. 1594, 2024**

A bylaw to adopt the Financial Plan for the years 2025 - 2029

WHEREAS Section 165 of the *Community Charter* requires the District to annually prepare and adopt a 5 Year Financial Plan, by bylaw; and

WHEREAS expenditures not provided for in the financial plan or the financial plan as amended, are not lawful except in the event of an emergency;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the District of Hope, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. Citation:

This bylaw may be cited for all purposes as the “**District of Hope 2025 – 2029 Financial Plan Bylaw No. 1594, 2024**”.

2. Objectives and Policies:

- Schedule “A”, attached to and forming part of this bylaw, sets out the objectives and policies for the period January 1, 2025 to December 31, 2029.
- Schedule “B”, attached to and forming part of this bylaw, outlines the Financial Plan for 2025 to 2029.

3. Consultation:

Pursuant to Section 166 of the *Community Charter*, a public consultation meeting was held on the 2nd day of December, 2024.

Read a first, second and third time this 9th day of December, 2024.

Adopted this XX day of XXXXX, 202X.

Schedule “A”

Statement of Objectives and Policies

In accordance with Section 165(3.1) of the *Community Charter*, municipalities are required to include in the Five-Year Financial Plan, objectives and policies regarding each of the following:

- (a) For each of the funding sources described in Section 165(7) of the *Community Charter*, the proportion of total revenue that is proposed to come from that funding source;
- (b) The distribution of property value taxes among the property classes that may be subject to taxes; and
- (c) The use of permissive tax exemptions.

Over the five-year period of the financial plan, the taxation requirement is estimated to increase annually by a growth factor of (3 - 9%) which covers increases in cost-of-living expenses and increases to contributions to reserves.

The current financial plan provides for \$11,287,400 to be generated from District of Hope property tax base for General Government, Infrastructure Reserve and Policing purposes.

The District has various objectives or policies that govern and affect the budget process and include:

Revenue Objective

- (a) The District will review fees/charges annually to ensure that they keep pace with changes in the cost-of-living as well as changes in the methods or levels of service delivery;
- (b) The District will actively pursue alternative revenue sources to help minimize property taxes;
- (c) The District will consider market rates and charges levied by other public and private organizations for similar services in establishing rates, fees and charges;
- (d) The District will establish cost recovery policies for fee-supported services. The Policies will consider whether the benefits received from the service are public and/or private;
- (e) The District will establish cost recovery policies for services provided for other levels of government;
- (f) General Revenues will not be dedicated for specific purposes, unless required by law or Canadian Public Sector Accounting Standards; and
- (g) The District will develop and pursue new and creative partnerships with government, community institutions (churches, schools), and community groups as well as private and non-profit organizations to reduce costs and enhance service to the community.

Surplus Funds

The *Community Charter* does not allow municipalities to plan an operating deficit (i.e., where expenditures exceed revenues). To ensure this situation does not occur, revenue projections are conservative and authorized expenditures are closely monitored. The combination of conservative revenue projections and controlled expenditures should produce a modest annual operating surplus.

Use of Surplus Funds

- (a) Council will review options and provide direction to staff regarding the allocation of any operating surplus prior to completion of the budget process for the following year.
- (b) To ensure the Accumulated Surplus is not excessive, the balance in the accumulated surplus account should not exceed a specific amount or guideline. The guideline is that Accumulated Surplus should not exceed 10% of the net operating budget.
- (c) Accumulated Surplus funds above the 10% guideline shall be used to:
 - i. fund capital expenditures or to increase reserves;
 - ii. pay off capital debt, including internal borrowings;
 - iii. stabilize District property tax and utility rate increases;
 - iv. fund other items as Council deems appropriate.
- (d) Staff will facilitate Council's review of the amount of Accumulated Surplus funds available on an annual basis.

Debt Objective

- (a) One-time capital improvements and unusual equipment purchases;
- (b) When the useful project life will exceed the term of financing;
- (c) Major equipment purchases;
- (d) Debt servicing is limited to no more than a 3% tax increase per year;
- (e) The maximum borrowing amount be limited to 25% (*Community Charter* allows for 25%) of the District's revenues as defined by the *Community Charter*; and
- (f) Reserves are to be considered as a funding source before debt.

Reserve Funds

Reserve funds shall be set aside to:

- (a) Provide sources of funds for future capital expenditures;
- (b) Provide a source of funding for areas of expenditure that fluctuate significantly from year to year (equipment replacement, special building maintenance, etc.);
- (c) Protect the District from uncontrollable or unexpected increases in expenditures or unforeseen reductions in revenues, or a combination of the two; and
- (d) Provide for working capital to ensure sufficient cash flow to meet the District's needs throughout the year.

Proportion of Taxes Allocated to Classes

It is Council's goal to ensure that there is a fair and equitable apportionment of taxes to each property class. The apportionment to each class is calculated using the multipliers determined by Council prior to preparing the annual tax rate bylaw. The tax multipliers will be reviewed and set by Council annually.

It should be noted that the multiplier is an estimate based on the approved tax rate increase.

Permissive Tax Exemptions

Permissive tax exemptions will be approved annually by Council. All applications for permissive tax exemptions will be considered in accordance with the Permissive Tax Exemption Policy.

Revitalization Tax Exemption

A revitalization tax exemption was available within a defined downtown area and provided a financial incentive to encourage development in the town center. The current bylaw has expired, however there are some active agreements still in effect until they expire.

Development Cost Charges

Development cost charges will be used to help fund capital projects deemed to be required in whole or in part due to development in the community. These charges will be set by bylaw and reviewed at a minimum every year to ensure that project estimates remain reasonable and the development costs charges are aligned with the strategic goals of Council.

PURPOSE:

To obtain Council authorization to proceed with public notification for a Development Variance Permit (DVP) for 477 Hudson Bay Street for parking access and rear lot line setback variances.

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT Council direct staff to proceed with notification for a Development Variance Permit for the following *Zoning Bylaw* variances:

- **Part 6.12.1** to allow off-street parking spaces to be accessed directly from a highway or street.
- **Part 13.2.5.1 (Setbacks)** to reduce the minimum rear lot line setback from 6.0 m to 4.5 m.

ANALYSIS:

Proposal

The applicant is proposing to establish a 3-storey 14-unit long term residential care facility on 477 Hudson Bay Street (the “subject property”). The proposal includes a minimum of 7 adaptable dwelling units which are designed and constructed with accessibility features and can accommodate future modifications to further enhance accessibility.

To facilitate the proposed development, the applicants have requested the following Zoning Bylaw variances to:

- 1) Allow direct access and egress for the 6-provided parking spaces directly onto Hudson Bay Street. This is a variance to the below *Zoning Bylaw* excerpt:
 - a. *6.12.1 Except in the Rural Zones and the Small-Scale Multi-Unit Housing (RS-1) Zone, every off-street parking space shall be designed so that all vehicular maneuvers immediately into or out of the parking space are carried out on-site and not onto a highway or street.*
- 2) Reduce the minimum rear lot line setback from 6.0 m to 4.5 m.

Rationale

Staff support the variance request based on the following rationale:

- The proposed building backs onto a 3.7 m wide alley which when combined with the reduced rear lot line setback of 4.5 m still provides an 8.2 m buffer between the proposed building and the neighbouring property’s rear lot line minimizing visual intrusion.
- According to the Integrated Transportation Network Plan, Hudson Bay Street is a low traffic volume local road. As such allowing vehicles to turn directly into and out of parking spaces onto Hudson Bay Street is unlikely to result in any traffic disruption or hazards.
- The surrounding area is designated as Downtown in the District IOCP but currently features single-family dwellings. The proposed setback and access variances are anticipated to have minimal impact on the viability future commercial or mixed-use redevelopment on this block of Hudson Bay Street.

Official Community Plan

The variance request aligns with the following Official Community Plan objectives and policies:

- *Objective 2.3 – to encourage proposals that integrate affordable housing throughout the community, rather than segregate or concentrate it in specific areas.*
 - *Policy 2.3.1 – Support the provision of affordable housing, including rental and special needs housing, in Downtown Hope and Urban/Suburban Residential designations through the use of housing agreements, density bonusing, inclusionary zoning, and financial incentives.*

While variance permits are not specifically mentioned in this policy, zoning flexibility to support the provision of accessible long-term residential care facilities is within the spirit of the policy.

- *Objective 2.4 – to encourage accessible and visitable housing.*

The proposed development is going to contain no less than 7 accessible dwelling units.

- *Objective 2.5 – to promote and facilitate the development of market and non-market affordable housing.*
 - *Policy 2.5.1 Continue to work with partners such as not-for-profit organizations, housing and community service agencies, businesses, faith organizations, the health care sector and others to develop creative solutions to provide affordable and emergency housing in Hope.*

By approving the proposed variances, the District will be assisting FISH in providing a much needed long term residential care facility in the community.

Notification

All property owners within 30 metres of the property will be notified of the requested variance in accordance with District of Hope *Application Procedures & Public Hearing/Information Meeting Procedural Bylaw No. 13/93*.

Other Requirements

If Council approves the variance, the applicant must apply for and receive a building permit before beginning construction.

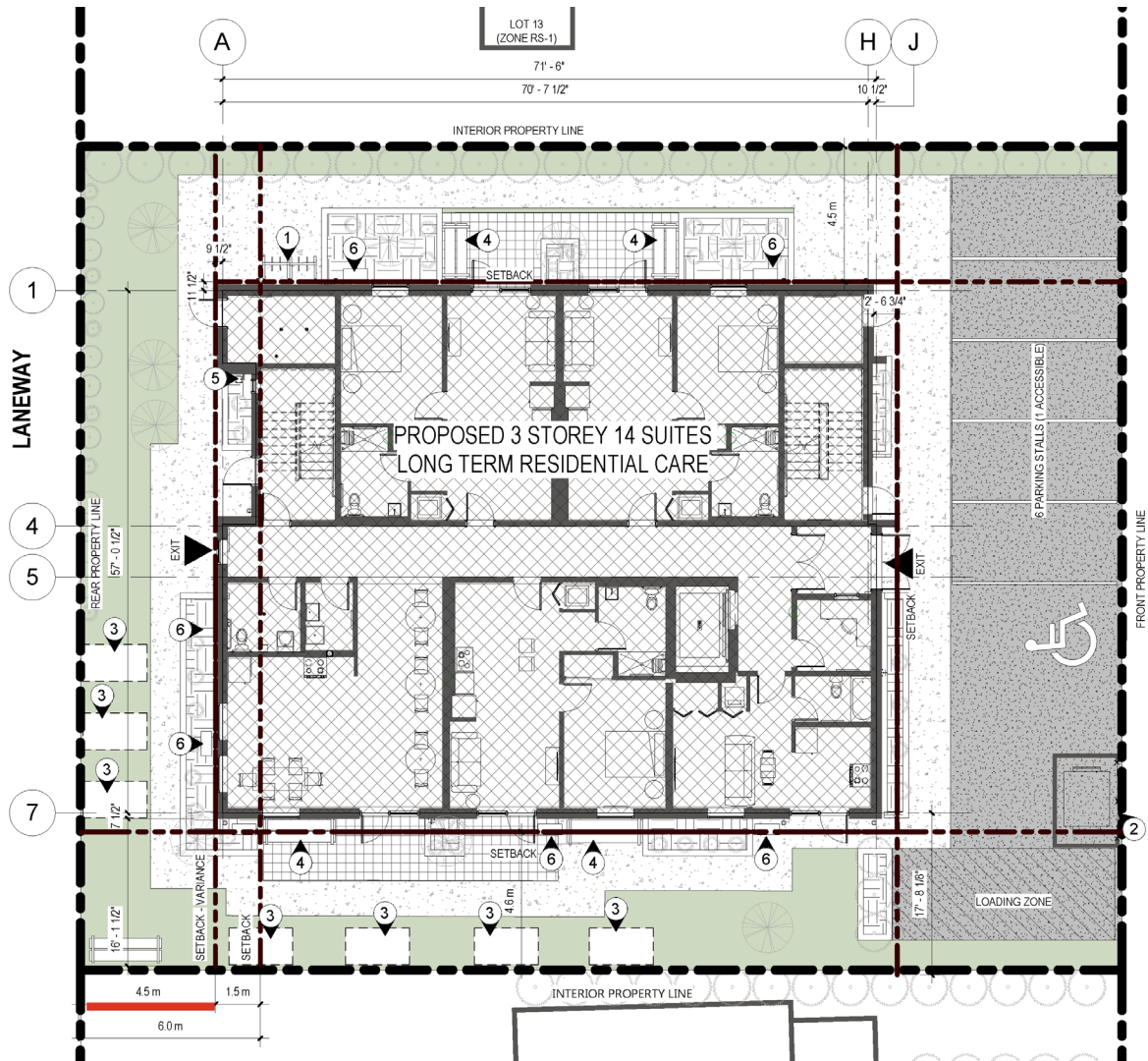

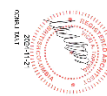

Property Description

Streamside Protection Development Permit Area –

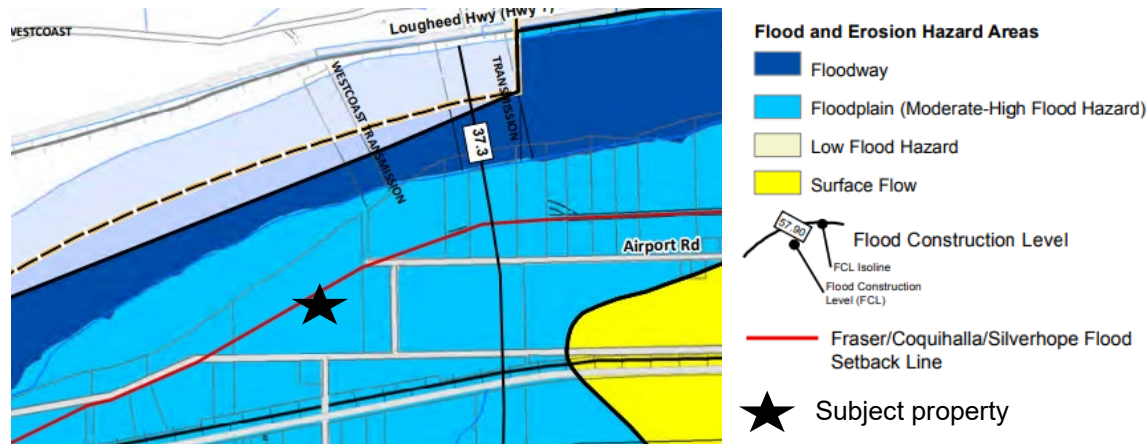
Development within 30 metres of a watercourse must obtain a provincially approved Riparian Areas Regulation Assessment. No development is proposed with 30 meters of the Fraser River, which is the only aquatic feature near the property.

Flood and Erosion Development Permit Area (DPA)

The property is mapped as being within the Floodplain (Moderate-High Flood Hazard), and portions of the property are within the Fraser River Flood Setback Line. The DPA states:

- No new development shall be permitted unless determined safe for the intended use in a site-specific report prepared by a Qualified Professional.
- All development in the Fraser River Floodplain must:
 - Be built to the Flood Construction Level if within the floodplain, but outside the flood setback line, or
 - Have a report from a Qualified Professional if development is within (river side) of the flood setback line

The owners are required to retain the services of a professional to review the site and determine safe building locations. Once a report satisfactory to the District of Hope has been obtained, the property owner will be required to place a save harmless covenant on the property title that acknowledges potential flood risk and any identified mitigation. The development permit will expire two years after issuance.

Official Community Plan

The OCP designation for the property and most of the surrounding area is Rural / Agriculture. This designation allows for the proposed residential addition provided it can be constructed in a way that adheres to the development permit area requirements.

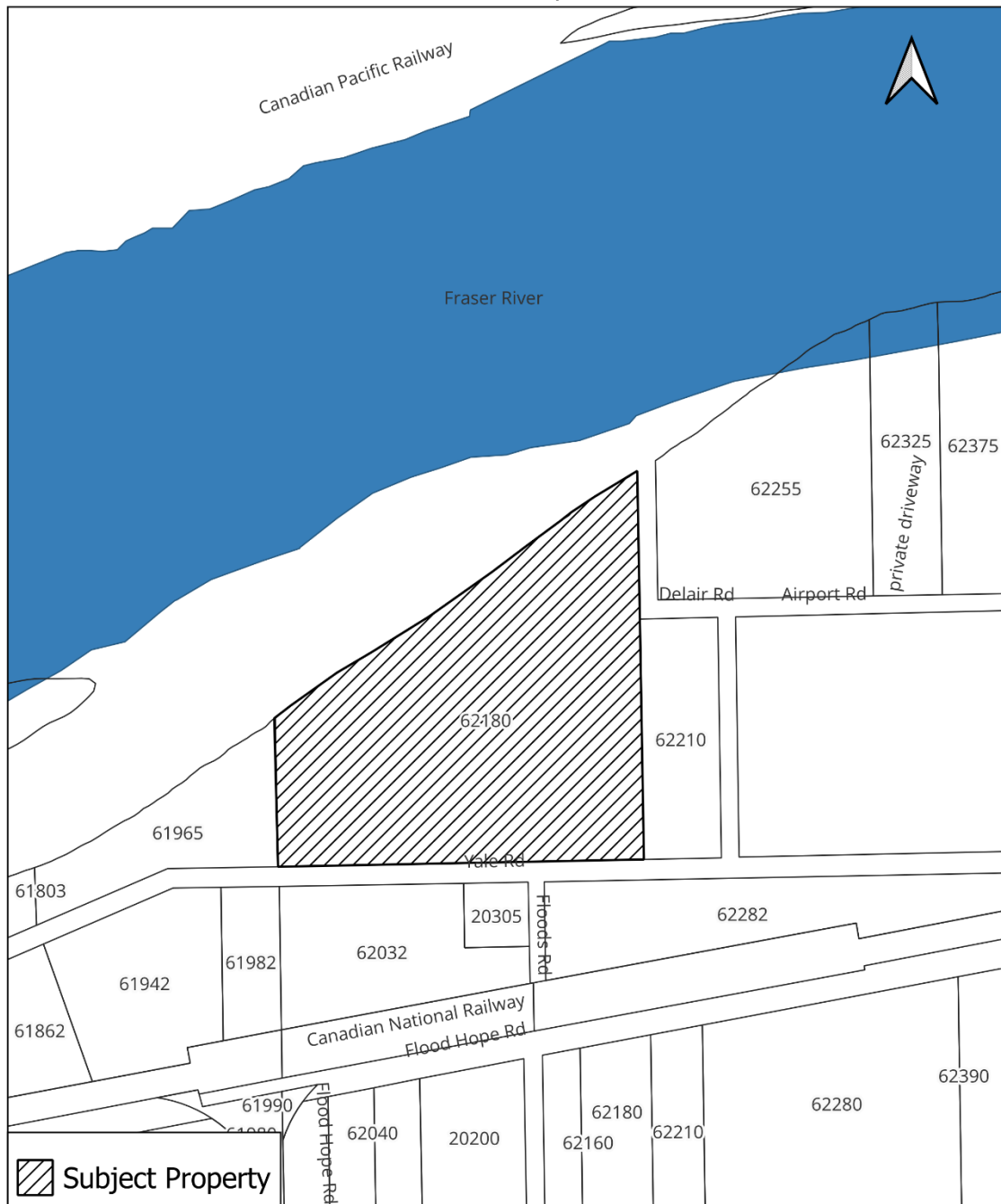

DISCUSSION:

Application History – 509 Corbett Street

In December 2024, a Development Variance Permit (DVP) application was made to facilitate the construction of a 425 m² light industrial building on the subject property.

During review of the DVP application it was discovered that the proposed light industrial building was to include a dwelling unit on the second floor.

Currently, the I-2 zone does permit a one family residence use, however, the definition for one family residence use requires the dwelling be a standalone structure. This means that the proposed dwelling unit within the principal use light industrial building is currently not permitted.

Staff followed-up with the applicant and provided two options: amend the plans to remove the dwelling unit or apply for a zoning text amendment to amend the I-2 zone to allow for a dwelling unit contained within the principal building on the lot.

The applicant has opted to apply for the zoning text amendment application to allow a dwelling unit within a principal industrial building.

Analysis

To determine if the zoning amendment request is viable and, if so, what regulations should be implemented, staff reviewed I-2 zoned parcels in the District to determine what impact permitting dwelling units in principal buildings would have on future development. Staff also reviewed the Light Industrial zones of Abbotsford, Chilliwack, Mission, Kent, and Merritt to see if dwelling units in principal light industrial buildings are permitted and what regulations are in place for them. These municipalities were selected for their proximity to Hope and in the case of Kent and Merritt, their comparable populations.

This analysis was intended to provide insight into how allowing a dwelling unit in a principal building could impact existing I-2 zoned parcels as well as determine what zoning bylaw regulations are in place for dwelling units in neighbouring municipalities.

I-2 Zone Review

Currently, Hope's I-2 zones are mostly located along or just off Old Hope Princeton Way and along Flood Hope Road. These areas are best accessed by car and their proximity to major transportation corridors facilitates more intensive, vehicle dependant land uses.

Few I-2 zoned parcels are greenfield sites however there are seven parcels on Corbett and Raab Streets that do not currently feature industrial operations.

Permitted principal uses in the I-2 zone are typical light industrial uses including storage and distribution, equipment sales, light manufacturing, and storage yards. These uses are generally compatible with the currently permitted accessory one family residence use. I-2 zoned lot sizes vary considerably. The twelve parcels on Corbett and Raab Street are below the I-2 minimum lot size of 930 m² while I-2 zoned parcels on OHPW and Flood-Hope Road exceed the minimum lot size.

For smaller I-2 zoned parcels, taking advantage of the permitted accessory one family residence is more challenging as they need to accommodate a separate building as well as the principal industrial building on the site. This adds site design complications related to access, parking, and setbacks and can limit the industrial potential of the lot if a residential building is also desired.

Overall, the review of I-2 zoned properties has shown that permitting an alternative but not additional residential dwelling unit on a property will have positive benefits to both existing and future industrial operations including expanding land use and site design options on smaller lots.

Neighbouring Municipality Zoning Bylaw Review

As detailed in the table below, all the reviewed municipalities permit dwelling units within industrial buildings in light industrial zones. Kent and Abbotsford have implemented a 90 m² maximum floor areas and Merritt allows the use subject to approval of it by the Approving Officer.

Staff Recommendation

As shown in the table above, Hope is currently the only reviewed municipality that does not permit dwelling units within principal industrial buildings. In consideration of this and the findings of the I-2 zone review, staff are recommending Council considers supporting the following zoning bylaw amendments to allow a dwelling unit within a principle building in the I-2 zone.

Add a Dwelling Unit as a Permitted Accessory Use in the I-2 Zone.

Staff are proposing to add a dwelling unit as a permitted accessory use in the I-2 zone. This will facilitate the proposed dwelling unit at 509 Corbett Street as well as allow dwelling units in principal buildings on all I-2 zoned parcels.

Given the findings from other municipalities and the zoning analysis, staff determined allowing dwelling units within principal buildings on all I-2 zoned parcels would be preferable to a site-specific text amendment for 509 Corbett Street as the overall change to land uses in the zone is minimal.

The Zoning Bylaw currently requires 1.2 parking spaces for dwelling units accessory to industrial uses and this requirement will apply to dwelling units within principal buildings in the I-2 zone.

Conditions of Use

Staff proposed the following conditions of use for dwelling units use in the I-2 zone:

- 1) A maximum of one dwelling unit is permitted per parcel.
- 2) A dwelling unit can be either a one family residence or a dwelling unit contained within the principal building on a parcel.

These conditions of use are intended to continue to allow one family residences as an option for I-2 zoned lots while also allowing dwelling units contained in the principal building on the site. The maximum number of permitted dwelling units in the I-2 zone remains at one.

Staff are proposing to not prescribe a maximum floor area for a dwelling unit within a principal building in the I-2 zone as the use requires a principal industrial operation be present on the lot and its anticipated that developers will be seeking to maximize the industrial value of I-2 zoned parcels over giving floor area to large contained dwelling units.

Staff are also not requiring the dwelling unit be located on the second floor of a principal building to both allow for flexibility in design but also allow for stair free access to the

dwelling unit in line with Official Community Plan (OCP) policies around accessibility and visitability.

Official Community Plan

The proposed bylaw amendments are consistent with the following OCP objectives and policies:

- *Community Land Use and Growth Management Objective 1.4 – to concentrate and mix compatible land uses to enable cost-effective and economically sustainable maintenance of public infrastructure.*

A one family residence use is permitted within the I-2 zone; the proposed zoning bylaw amendments are intended to provide additional flexibility for residential uses in the I-2 zone without increasing the number of dwelling units permitted in the I-2 zone.

- *Residential Land Uses and Housing Objective 2.2 – To support a variety of housing types, lot sizes and densities to meet the changing needs of current and future residents.*

The proposed bylaw amendments increase the flexibility of housing types in the I-2 zone which can be beneficial by allowing property owners to reside on the same lot as their industrial operation.

- *Industrial Land Objective 4.3 – to attract clean and environmentally-friendly light industry jobs for existing and new residents and to strengthen the tourism/service sector.*
 - *Policy 4.3.2 – encourage the redevelopment of brownfield sites.*

The proposed zoning bylaw amendments provide additional flexibility for I-2 developments which can increase the feasibility of redevelopment in brownfield sites.

Notification

Two notices will be in the Hope Standard detailing the proposed bylaws amendments no later than 10 days prior to the public hearing.

A Bylaw to amend the District of Hope Zoning Bylaw No. 1324, 2012

WHEREAS pursuant to Section 479 of the *Local Government Act*, a local government may adopt a Zoning Bylaw;

1. This Bylaw may be cited for all purposes as the “***District of Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 1596, 2024***”.

ENACTMENT

2. That the following be added under Light/Service Industrial (I-2) Zone Part 12.2.2.2 Permitted Accessory Uses:

d) *A dwelling unit.*

3. That the following be removed from Light/Service Industrial (I-2) Zone Part 12.2.2.2 Permitted Accessory Uses:

d) *One family residence.*

4. That the following be added under Light/Service Industrial (I-2) Zone Part 12.2.3 Conditions of Use:

.5 A maximum of 1 *dwelling unit* is permitted on a *parcel*.

.6 The following are permitted as a *dwelling unit* in this zone:

a) *a one family residence.*

b) *a dwelling unit* contained within the principal building.

5. That the following be removed from Light/Service Industrial (I-2) Zone Part 12.2.3 Conditions of Use and the list be renumbered accordingly:

.5 There shall be not more than 1 *one family residence* on a *parcel*.

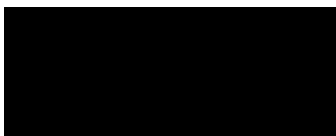

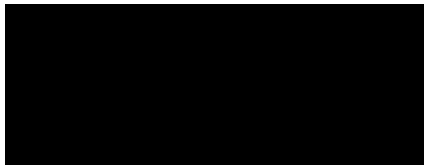
Thank you for providing a final report and financial summary for the above noted project. We have reviewed your submission and all reporting requirements have been met.
